The SFPD should expand its partnership with and further support neighborhood organizations that work to provide art, sports, educational, and leadership development opportunities for young people in the community.

DOJ Objective: Community Policing

Executive Summary:

Since 1959, the San Francisco Police Activities League has provided San Francisco youth with healthy activities and leadership programs to develop positive characteristics for life. PAL serves almost 1,000 youth annually throughout the city. We run our programs with a small central office staff and through the efforts of nearly a hundred volunteer civilian coaches and police mentors. SF PAL is an independent nonprofit that receives no funding from the City of San Francisco or the San Francisco Police Department. Our programs offer many youth considered "at-risk" an opportunity to develop career and life skills through various sports programs, the Law Enforcement Cadet Program, and community service opportunities. Our philosophy is to leave no child behind, and as such those children and their families who cannot afford our low cost programs, we offer full financial aid.

For more than 50 years, SFPAL has sponsored the PAL Law Enforcement Cadet Program; a leadership & job skills development and community service program for youth between 14 to 20 years of age.

In addition to the PAL Cadet program, the 2017 PAL program currently facilitates five different sports programs; Football, Cheer & Dance, Jiu-jitsu, Sandlot, and Fishing. We serve boys and girls from every neighborhood in San Francisco; from Chinatown to the Sunset to Bayview and Visitacion Valley. Two-thirds of the participants are boys, and one-third are girls.
