## Captain Paul Yep's Message

### Auto Burglary (Break-ins) in the Central District

Auto Burglary (Theft from Vehicle) is a top enforcement priority for the Central Police District.

Our Crime Analysis Unit took an in-depth look at the data for our District. Here's what we know: Auto Burglaries happen every day of the week, slightly more often on Mondays and Tuesdays. There is no significant statistical difference during the other days of the week.

Seventy percent occur between 8:00AM to 8:00PM, during daylight hours! Seventy seven percent of Auto Burglary occur on the street; fifteen percent occur in parking lots; and eight percent occur in public garages.

Bay Street at the Embarcadero and North Point Street at Taylor Street are the top two repeat locations in the district.

Most of the criminals involved with auto burglaries work in teams. They do surveillance, have "spotters" and have "getaway" cars. They are fast and elusive!

The Central Station Street Crimes Unit (plain clothes team) has been working diligently and tirelessly to catch these criminals. They made over 180 arrest in 2017! We are also working closely with District Attorney's office to prosecute the offenders. We will monitor future convictions and sentencings to see what penalties the offenders will receive. We will continue to make more arrests. We are not deterred from taking strong enforcement action.

How can you help?

- Do NOT leave any property in your parked car. Not even in the trunk!

### Burglary (Commercial and Residential)

**Burglary** – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

2/12	6:15pm	<b>Burglary, Commercial 200 BLK of Front</b>	An unknown suspect stole a laptop and tablet from the office. It is unknown how the suspect gained entry to the office.
2/13	1:15am	<b>Burglary, Apartment 2300 BLK of Powell</b>	The victim was watching the video surveillance and saw an unknown suspect use a tool to gain entry to the lobby. The suspect picked up packages and looked at them. The victim went to confront the suspect and told him to leave. The suspect complied and exited the building. Once outside the suspect pulled out a knife from his jacket. The suspect did not advance at the victim or make any threats. The suspect then fled the scene.

2/13	6:30pm	<b>Burglary, Commercial 800 BLK of Montgomery</b>	An unknown suspect shattered the front glass door and stole property.

The victim watched the video and does not recognize the suspect as an employee. The victim called the police. The Officers detained the suspect in the lobby of the building. <b>Arrest made.</b>

2/19	6:00pm	<b>Burglary, Apartment Unit BLK of Genoa</b>	An unknown suspect stole the victim's bicycle that was secured in the garage.

2/21	12:00am	<b>Burglary, Hot Prowl 700 BLK of Francisco</b>	An unknown suspect broke into the victim's vehicle that was parked in front of the victim's garage. The suspect stole the garage door opener and other property. The suspect opened the garage door and stole property in the garage.
2/21	2:29am	<b>Burglary, Apartment 1100 BLK of Jones</b>	Two unknown suspects entered the building and stole packages from the lobby.
2/22	5:17am	<b>Burglary, Apartment 700 BLK of Post</b>	An unknown suspect entered the building and stole packages from the mailroom.
2/22	5:50am	<b>Burglary, Commercial 200 BLK of Green</b>	An unknown suspect shattered the front glass door and tried to cut security cords tied to computers, but was unsuccessful.

2/23	12:30pm	<b>Burglary, Commercial 900 BLK of Sansome</b>	An unknown suspect forced into the business, but was possibly scared off by the loud audible alarm.
2/23	4:00pm	<b>Burglary, Apartment 800 BLK of Sutter</b>	An unknown suspect entered the building and stole packages from the mailroom.
2/23	7:00pm	<b>Burglary, Commercial 100 BLK of Sutter</b>	An unknown suspect gained entry into the office and forced open the computer server room door. After an inventory of the office, it appears nothing was stolen or out of place.
2/24	9:38pm	<b>Burglary, Attempt, Hot Prowl Unit BLK of Himmelmann</b>	The victims heard a knock at the door, but believed it may have been the neighbor's door. The victims then heard something fall over and break in their living. The victims went to check and found the window screen removed and the outer pane of their window broken.
2/25	11:39pm	<b>Burglary, Hot Prowl 1300 BLK of Hyde</b>	The victim was in his apartment when he heard noises outside of his apartment. When the victim opened the door to investigate, he saw two unknown suspects running out of the front door of the building. The victim reviewed the surveillance footage and saw the suspects pried open the front door and entered into a closet. The suspects searched the closet then fled the scene.

### Aggravated Assault

**Assault** – An unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

2/12	9:20am	<b>Aggravated Assault, With Other Weapon 800 BLK of Geary</b>	The suspect is a known shoplifter in the store and the victim told him to leave. The suspect threatened to harm the victim and exited the store. The suspect returned and threw a glass bottle towards the victim. Officers responded and saw the suspect matching the description standing at the corner. The suspect was positively identified by the victim. <b>Arrest made.</b>
2/16	5:30am	<b>Aggravated Assault, With Gun 200 BLK of Sutter</b>	An unknown suspect entered the store and was attempting to steal items. An employee tried to retrieve the items, but the suspect dropped the items and walked towards the exit. At the door, the suspect turned around, pulled out a gun and pointed it at the employee and a customer in the store. The suspect backed out of the store and fled the scene.
2/19	7:30pm	<b>Aggravated Assault, With Knife Post/Powell</b>	The victim heard someone scream that his cell phone was stolen. The victim saw the male facing a suspect. A second suspect approached with a broomstick. The victim went to assist and tackled the first suspect to the ground. The victim then was stabbed in the back by an unknown suspect. The victim ran from the scene and went to the hospital.

2/24	4:40pm	<b>Aggravated Assault, With Gun</b> <b>Stockton/Sacramento</b>	The victims were walking in the Stockton Tunnel when they heard screaming. The victims turned around and saw the suspect jumped over the railing and fired shots in the tunnel.

### Robbery

**Robbery** – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

2/15	1:00pm	<b>Robbery, Attempt, With Force</b> <b>Bush/Battery</b>	The victim felt someone brush up against her side. The victim turned and saw an unknown suspect reach into her jacket pocket to take her cell phone. The victim confronted the suspect and the suspect threatened to hit the victim. The suspect tugged at the victim's headphone cord and managed to force the cell phone out of the jacket pocket. The cell phone fell to the ground. A second suspect grabbed the cell phone and both suspects fled the scene.
2/15	3:09pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Knife</b> <b>100 BLK of Jackson</b>	The suspect entered the store and stole merchandise. As the suspect walked towards the exit, security told the suspect to stop. The suspect continued to push his way through the door. The suspect then pulled out a knife and threatened to "cut" security. The suspect ran back into the store and grabbed a bottle of wine. Officers arrived and detained the suspect. <b>Arrest made.</b>
2/15	4:00pm	<b>Robbery, With Knife</b> <b>800 BLK of Sutter</b>	An unknown suspect approached the victim from behind and pressed a knife against her side. The suspect demanded money. The victim gave the suspect money and he then fled the scene.
2/18	2:22am	<b>Robbery, With Gun</b> <b>Grant/Columbus</b>	The victim saw the suspect and confronted the suspect who he believed had stolen property from his vehicle earlier. A verbal argument ensued, then the suspect pulled out a gun and pointed at the victim's head. The suspect snatched the victim's cell phone from his hand and then fled the scene.
2/18	5:15pm	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>Market/Front</b>	The suspect smooched the victim's face with his hand and stole her sunglasses from her face. The second victim confronted the suspect and he was punched in the face. The victims flagged down Officers and the Officers detained the suspect. <b>Arrest made.</b>
2/19	5:53pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Force</b> <b>100 BLK of Stockton</b>	The suspect entered the store and stole merchandise. The suspect was confronted by security outside of the store. The suspect attempted to run away by pushing security as they grabbed him. The suspect continued to resist till Officers arrived. <b>Arrest made.</b>
2/19	7:00pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Other Weapon</b> <b>1300 BLK of Stockton</b>	An unknown suspect entered the store and stole merchandise. An employee stopped the suspect at the exit. The suspect pushed the employee back, but the employee did not move and asked for the stolen items. The suspect then slashed the employee with an unknown sharp edged object and fled the scene.
2/19	9:30pm	<b>Robbery, With Gun</b> <b>100 BLK of Stevenson</b>	An unknown suspect grabbed the victim's shoulder bag off of the victim's shoulder. The victim turned around and saw the suspect holding a gun in his hand. The suspect then fled the scene.
2/19	9:39pm	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>Greenwich/Grant</b>	An unknown suspect pushed the victim to the ground as she exited her Uber ride. The suspect grabbed her bag on her back and fled the scene.
2/19	10:15pm	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>Waverly/Sacramento</b>	Two unknown suspects approached the victim and pushed her to the ground. One of the suspects held the victim down while the other suspect tried to get her purse. Fearing that the suspects would punch her, the victim gave the suspects her purse. The suspect then fled the scene.
2/20	1:40pm	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>Green/Battery</b>	The three suspects approached the victim and stole her cell phone from her hands. The victim chased the suspects and one of them grabbed her and threw her to the ground. The victim continued to chase and a witness also chased the suspects. One of the suspects threatened to shoot them. Officers arrived and detained the suspects. <b>Arrests made.</b>

2/20	8:50pm	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>800 BLK of Clay</b>	Three unknown suspects approached the three victims and pulled on the victims' purses. The victims struggled with the suspects and fell to the ground. One of the victims was punched in the face several times. The suspects fled in a vehicle. The suspect vehicle was later located in Oakland and two of the suspects were detained. <b>Arrests made.</b>
2/22	10:36am	<b>Robbery, Bank, With Force</b> <b>400 BLK of Sutter</b>	An unknown suspect entered the bank and handed a note to the teller that said "robbery" on it. The teller opened his money drawer and place the money on the counter. The suspect grabbed the money and fled the scene.
2/22	2:55pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Force</b> <b>500 BLK of Market</b>	Two unknown suspects entered the store and stole merchandise. An employee followed one of the suspects out of the store and confronted him. The suspect punched the employee in the eye and fled the scene with the second suspect.
2/23	10:45am	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Force</b> <b>200 BLK of Powell</b>	An unknown suspect entered the store and stole a coat. Security tried to stop the suspect from exiting to retrieve the coat. Security was able to pull the coat out of the suspect's grasp. The suspect then sprayed an unknown chemical at security. Security was able to back away to avoid being sprayed. The suspect then grabbed two coats off the rack near the entrance and fled the scene.
2/23	5:09pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Force</b> <b>200 BLK of Powell</b>	A group of suspects entered the store and grabbed merchandise and walked towards the exit. An employee tried to block the doorway, but the suspects pushed past her and fled. Officers in the area saw three suspects running and dropping merchandise. The Officers detained the suspects. The store employee approached the Officers and stated that the three detained suspects had just robbed the store. <b>Arrests made.</b>
2/23	9:37pm	<b>Robbery, Commercial, With Knife</b> <b>400 BLK of Geary</b>	Three unknown suspects were inside the restaurant trying to steal food. When an employee was counting money with the cash register drawer open, one of the suspects reached over the counter and stole money. The suspects then fled the scene.
2/24	10:05pm	<b>Robbery, With Gun</b> <b>700 BLK of Beach</b>	An unknown suspect approached the victim and demanded her shoes. The suspect then pulled out a gun and racked the slide back. Fearing for her safety, the victim took off her shoes. The suspect grabbed the shoes and fled the scene in a vehicle.
2/25	3:25pm	<b>Robbery, With Force</b> <b>Beach/Larkin</b>	The victim returned to his vehicle to retrieve an item from the trunk. As he was retrieving the item, he was pushed away by an unknown suspect. The suspect stole a purse from the vehicle and fled away in a vehicle.



## Incidents of Note

### **Burglary, Non-Residential, Forcible Entry**

2/17/18 0642 hrs

500 BLK of Commercial St

Central Station uniformed officers responded to Leo's Oyster Bar on reports of a person breaking into a restaurant closed for business at the time. The reporting party observed the suspect break into the restaurant through a security camera. Officers detained the suspect in the lobby area of the restaurant. Officers learned that the suspect had numerous prior burglary arrests and that he was on probation with a burglary charge. Suspect was booked at County Jail.

### **Robbery, with Force**

2/18/18 1715 hrs

Market/Front Streets

Uniformed officers were flagged down by the victims. The victims told the officers that a suspect had slapped the female victim and taken the sunglasses she was wearing. The male victim tried to intervene after the fact and the suspect punched him in the face to get away. Officers located the suspect a short distance away. The victims positively identified the suspect. Suspect was booked at County Jail.

### **Robbery, Street or Public Place, with Gun**

2/18/18 0222 hrs

Grant/Columbus Avenues

Uniformed officers responded to reports of a robbery at Grant and Columbus Avenue. Officers learned the victim and the suspect got into a verbal altercation while the victim was waiting on a tow truck for his vehicle. The suspect pulled a firearm from his waist band, took the victim's cell phone and fled the area on foot. The suspect's wallet dropped from his pants as he fled the area. The wallet provided information for a potential suspect. The next day, the victim went to Vallejo, California where his phone was pinging to. The Vallejo Police Department detained the suspect and the victim identified the suspect from the earlier incident. Central Station officers responded to Vallejo and took custody of the suspect. The suspect was booked at County Jail.

**Theft, From Unlocked Vehicle <\$50**

2/24/18 1900 hrs

Bay/Midway Streets

Central Station plainclothes officers were conducting vehicle burglary abatement on Bay Street near The Embarcadero when they observed a suspect casing vehicles. Officers observed the suspect enter a vehicle in the area. Officers approached the suspect while he was still in the vehicle. The suspect had possession of property from the vehicle, which he quickly discarded. Officers made contact with the responsible party of the vehicle and determined the suspect may have entered the vehicle through an unlocked door as there was no damage to the vehicle. The suspect was issued a citation for the vehicle tampering and possession of stolen property violations.

**Evading a Police Officer, Injury or Death**

2/24/18 2217 hrs

900 BLK of North Point St

Uniformed officers located a vehicle that was possibly used as a getaway vehicle for a robbery incident involving a gun. Officers attempted to detain the occupants of the vehicle, but the vehicle fled from the officers. The occupants of the vehicle were eventually detained after the vehicle stopped due to a traffic collision. The occupants fled the scene, but were detained by officers. The victim positively identified the suspects. The two juvenile passengers in the vehicle were released to their parents. The driver of the vehicle was booked at County Jail.

**Firearm, Loaded, In Vehicle, Possession or Use**

2/25/18 1930 hrs

900 BLK of North Point St

Plainclothes officers were conducting vehicle burglary abatement in the area of Ghirardelli Square. The officers made contact with a security guard for the garage who had witnessed a habitual vehicle burglar in the area. The suspect damaged the gate of the Square garage when he exited the garage in a vehicle. The officers located the suspect and a passenger in the described vehicle. During a search of the vehicle, a loaded pistol was recovered from underneath the driver's seat of the vehicle. The passenger of the vehicle was cited for possession of a burglary tool and the driver of the vehicle was booked at County Jail for the weapons violation as well as the possession of a burglary tool.

# Featured Officer of the Month

## Officer Michael Graham

*Each month Central Police Station features one of its officers in an effort to learn more about the men and women who police our neighborhood. This month, we interviewed Officer Michael Graham, a 1-year member of Central Police Station.*



Officer Graham was born in Winchester, MA and graduated from Winthrop High School in Winthrop, MA. Officer Graham attended Suffolk University in Boston, MA and graduated with a Bachelor's of Science in Finance. Officer Graham was enlisted in the United States Marine Corp infantry from 1994-1997.

Before becoming a Police Officer, Officer Graham was previously employed as a United States Border Patrol Agent in Southern California for 4 years. Officer Graham joined the San Francisco Police Department in June 2012. After graduating from the Police Academy, he was assigned to Ingleside Station for field training. After field training, he was assigned to Bayview Station for his probation station. After probation, he was assigned to Mission Station as his permanent station. During his time at Mission Station, he worked the 16th/ Mission foot beat and Undercover Plainclothes detail. In October 2016, Officer Graham took his transfer to come work at Central Station. He is currently working the midnight watch and usually patrols the North Beach and Telegraph Hill areas. Officer Graham is also a member of the Specialist Team.

## Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles to locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

## Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Central Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Central Station have beat officers assigned to Union Square, Fisherman's Wharf, Chinatown, North Beach and Market/Drumm area.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Central Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.

## Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



### What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

### Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.


