Dear SAFE Friends & Supporters:

The Summer holiday and vacation season is now upon us with long holiday weekends and even more extended vacation trips planned in the months ahead. While away, we should not forget that our home could become an inviting target for burglars, who seldom take vacations when their victims do. Here are some steps to take to prevent your home from becoming an easy target for burglars; please pass on the information to your communities and neighbors:

1. Make sure your doors and windows are locked when you are away from home. It is unbelievable, but true, that approximately half of all residential burglaries are made via unforced entries. That is making it too easy for the burglars. Keep doors and windows closed and locked tight.

- 2. The same goes for garage doors. They should be closed and locked tight, so no one can see if your car is gone. If you have an automatic garage door opener, unplug it.
- 3. If you return and find a door or window has been forced or broken while you were gone, do not enter. Go to a neighbor's house and call the police (415) 553-0123 or 9-1-1 for emergencies.
- 4. Do not publicize your absence by leaving a message on your telephone answering machine giving specific information about your absence: "I'll be gone until Sunday". It is better to keep your message vague.
- 5. Also, let your alarm service provider know specific information about times you will be absent from your home.
- 6. Let trusted neighbors know when you are leaving and when you plan to return, so they can be extra alert for anything suspicious. Try to leave a number where you can be reached in an emergency.
- 7. Notify the Post Office to hold your mail or have a neighbor pick it up daily. Also arrange to have your newspapers put on hold or diverted.
- 8. Use automatic timers to turn lights on in multiple locations in the house at dusk, and off at your bedtime. Vary the lights to be turned on and have a radio or TV on a timer. Never leave lights or the radio on constantly. Tune your radio to a talk show so that voices can be heard.
- 9. Your home and yard should reflect current occupation; keep the property in good maintenance and repair.

Have a worry free vacation this summer with improved home security while your home is "Home Alone". For additional safety and effective neighborhood surveillance, establish a SAFE Neighborhood Watch group, or get a SAFE residential security assessment to learn how make your home more burglar-resistant. Bayview Officers responded to the 2200 block of Quesada Avenue on report of an attempted robbery. Officers Norris and Whitfield reported that a woman was getting out of her car when she was approached by three masked robbers. One of them pointed a silver handgun at her and told her not to move. The two remaining robbers rummaged through the woman's car. A dog began to bark and scared the robbers off before they could steal anything. The robbers fled in a 4 door car.

A few minutes and a few blocks later the robbers went to Industrial and Oakdale Avenue and robbed a man that was sitting in his car waiting for his wife to get off work. The victim went to Bayview Station to report the incident.

The assailants were described as Black males ranging in age from 15-25 years old. They were wearing all black clothing.

Tuesday, July 4th, 2006, 9:05 AM - Auto Burglary - Toland Street and Jerrold Street - CS# 060 707 127 - A security guard was a witness to an auto burglary and assisted in the perpetrator's capture. The guard reported that he heard a commotion behind the building he was guarding. He looked and saw a man punch his hand through a car's window. The guard called 911. He made eye contact with perpetrator who was now fleeing. The guard followed him on his bike and pointed him out to arriving police. The man, a San Francisco resident, was booked for auto burglary.

Tuesday, July 4th, 2006, 10:50PM - Assault with a Gun - Potrero Hill Housing - CS# 060 709 139 - A Daly City woman was shot in the leg late this evening while walking with two companions from Oakland in the Potrero Hill Housing Complex. One of the witnesses reports the gun man was firing a gun from behind them and then fled. The suspect was described as a black male wearing a white hat, black jacket, and blue jeans. The victim was released early the next morning.

Wednesday, July 5th, 2006, 1:13AM - Homicide w/Gun - Ingalls Street and Hudson Avenue - CS# 060 709 496 - A 23 year old man fell victim to gun violence this morning. Because of an ongoing investigation by the Homicide Inspectors, details are being withheld.

Wednesday, July 5th, 2006, 7:45 AM - Attempted Kidnapping - Bayview District - CS# 060 709 957 - Officer Bandvick was dispatched to an area school on a report of an attempted kidnapping. It was learned that al4 year old female was walking down the street. She passed a parked vehicle and the driver, a stranger, motioned with her to get in his car. She continued walking. The driver followed her slowly as she walked and then blocked her path with his car. He rolled down the window and told the girl, "Get in the car." The girl ran around back of the car and to a school where there was a security guard. The girl was able to get a partial license plate of the vehicle.

Officer Catlett began to run the license plate and plugged in different numbers in to try to figure out the missing character. He found a vehicle that was from the district and matched the description given by the girl. Officer Catlett found a mug shot of the registered owner of the car and that too matched the description of the suspect

A photo lineup was prepared and the girl picked up her would be kidnapper. The next day, the police staked out the suspect's house and arrested him without incident as he exited.

This story has a happy ending, if the girl had gotten into the vehicle, there is no telling what could have happened to her. Please educate others about this case and by all means never, never, get into a stranger's car

Wednesday, July 5, 2006, 4:00PM - Evading a Police Officer, Domestic Violence Stay Away Order Violation, Narcotics Arrest, Stolen Vehicle - Hamilton and Silliamn Streets- CS# 060 712 427 - The residents of the Portola District found the Officers from the Bayview Station running around their neighborhood and through their backyards in search of a felon. The incident began when Officer Catlett was approached by a woman who stated her friend was being harassed by her ex-boyfriend, a few blocks away. Officer Catlett went to investigate and saw the man and woman talking by a vehicle. Officer Catlett asked the woman if she was having a problem, when the man jumped in his car and began to drive away. Officer Catlett attempted to broadcast the situation but his handheld radio was dead.

Officer Catlett got into his car and gave chase. He was able to broadcast the description of the man fleeing. Other units began to respond. The suspect drove into a cul-de-sac and was blocked by Officer Catlett. The suspect left the car and began to run.

Officer Catlett lost sight of the suspect. Responding Bayview Units surrounded the area that the suspect was last seen. A citizen told one of the officers that the suspect was now on a roof of the house. The suspect now realizing that he had no chance for escape gave up. Another citizen supplied the officers with a ladder to get the suspect to come down.

Turns out the man, from San Francisco, was driving a stolen car and had a stay away order from the woman he was first seen with. Also in his possession was methamphetamine. He was booked for these plus many other charges along with a notification to his probation officer.

Wednesday, July 6, 2006 - 4:40AM - Numerous Narcotics Violations, Suspended Driver's License - 3rd and Evans - CS# 060 713 726 - Officer Tennenbaum and Officer Brown pulled over a vehicle for a minor traffic violation. They contacted the driver who had a suspended driver's license. In a search of the person incident to his arrest they found, 5 bindles of heroin, 4 baggies of marijuana, 3 packages of methamphetamine, 2 unknown type of pills, and a straw with suspected cocaine. He was booked for numerous narcotics violations and driving with a suspended driver's license.

Thursday, July 7, 2006 - Battery of a Police Officer, Resisting Arrest, Marijuana Offense - Potrero Hill Housing - CS# 060 719 423 - Officers Benzinger, Alcaraz, Solares, and DeJesus were operating in a plainclothes capacity in the Potrero Hill Housing area when they saw a person that matched the description of someone who was wanted. This person saw the

police and ran into a unit. The police ran up to the door and heard a woman yell from behind a closed door, "You can not come in here like that." The police knocked on the door and the woman answered. The woman, who turns out was the suspect's mother, yelled for him to come downstairs.

The suspect came downstairs and the police asked him for his name. When the suspect did not answer fast enough his mother told the police his name. The suspect told his mother to stop. The mother told the suspect, "You have to tell them you are on probation." The suspect yelled, "Don't tell them that," and punched his mother in the face.

The police moved in and attempted to arrest the man. The man fought with the officers and at one point kicked at them. The young man was brought into custody. A search of him revealed that he had marijuana on his person.

The mother unfazed by the fact that her son punched her, yelled at police as her son was being led away, "We can smoke weed if we want to!"

It should be noted that the man was not the person that was wanted to the police. He would have been identified and let go at the scene.

Saturday, July 8, 2006, 9:00 AM, 74 Cameron, Burglary in progress (Case # 060722175): Officers responded to a report of a burglary in progress. When they arrived, the ever alert Officer Kwan spotted a man carrying a crowbar walking away behind the buildings that line the north side of Cameron. While Officer Hopkins was interviewing the reportee, Officer Kwan happened to walk the suspect by the reportee who then exclaimed, "That's him!" An arrest search of the suspect revealed that he had several other burglary tools besides the crowbar. A warrant check revealed that he was on felony probation and that he had an outstanding warrant for his arrest. The suspect was booked at Bayview Station on attempted burglary, the warrant, probation violation and possession of burglary tools charges.

Saturday, July 8, 2006, 3:30 PM, Hudson & Phelps, Possesion of stolen property (Case # 060723292): Plain clothes officers located a man wanted on outstanding warrants at Phelps and Hudson. During the arrest search they found two credit cards that did not belong to the suspect. Using his lights and siren, he safely approached the white Ford which was going approximately 2-3 mph down San Bruno Avenue. Officer Gasanyan attempted to stop the Ford, but the driver would not stop. At Woolsey the driver made an illegal U-turn and started driving north on San Bruno, again at 2-3 mph. The driver kept making an obscene gesture at Officer Gasanyan with his middle finger. Other officers arrived on scene and were able to stop the car. When they approached the car, the driver was seen to be chanting; he would not get out of the car despite several orders to do so. Eventually he was physically removed from the car and taken to a hospital. At the hospital he had a heart rate of 234. His car was towed.

Saturday, July 8, 2006, 6:00 PM, Ingalls & Oakdale, Stolen motorcycle, reckless riding, evading, resisting and numerous traffic violations (Case # 060717643): Officers Chiang and McCormick were on patrol at Ingalls and Oakdale when they saw a motorcycle rider speed down Oakdale Avenue at speed exceeding 50 mph endangering the lives of the numerous pedestrians that are on that street in the late afternoon. The officers followed the motorcycle east on Oakdale, but soon saw that the rider had turned around and was heading right towards them. The motorcycle sped by them at over 50 mph and attempted to turn north at Ingalls. However showing his lack of riding skill, he went into the turn too fast and crashed the bike into a parked car. The officers turned around and attempted to block his way out. The criminal was able to pull his bike from under the car, but then dropped it on the squad car.

Seeing that he had run out of time with the motorcycle, the suspect then lead the officers on a footchase into the Oakdale Baldwin housing projects which ended when he couldn't outrun Officer McCormick.

The motorcycle turned out to be stolen. The suspect also had a warrant for his arrest. He was booked on so many charges, that it would bore the readers to see them.

Sunday, July 9, 2006, 11:30 AM, 23rd and 3rd, Homicide: A man was found shot in his car parked on the west side of 3rd, facing northbound. According to witnesses at the scene, they heard shots, then saw two cars at 25th and 3rd. A black sedan sped south on third, but the other car drove north on the south bound lanes of 3rd, then crossed over the new light rail tracks to the north bound lanes. Near 23rd, the car again crossed the street into the south bound lanes and came to a stop just north of 23rd on the south bound side. The man was rushed to SFGH, but was pronounced dead shortly after arrival.

The San Francisco Chronicle reported that the victim had an extensive narcotics history.

(Case # 060726036): As you may have heard on the news, copper is selling at an all time high, making those pennies that you are saving in a jar worth more melted down than they are as pennies. Criminals know this too and theft of copper pipe and wiring is also on the increase. One such criminal decided to steal the copper from a pay phone, using a hatchet to get at the wiring. Alert citizens notified the police and the suspect was taken into custody and booked on vandalism charges at Bayview Station.

Sunday, July 9, 2006, 3:24 PM, San Bruno & Felton, Narcotics arrest (Case # 060726575): Officer Gasanyan who is assigned as the Portola Beat cop, was patrolling the San Bruno corridor when he saw a truck parked in a driveway completely blocking the sidewalk and impeding the flow of traffic on San Bruno because it stuck so far out into the street. Officer Gasanyan approached the truck and noticed that the two occupants were talking about folded up latex glove that the driver was holding. Knowing that narcotics are often packaged this way, Officer Gasanayan told the driver to hand him the glove, which was found to contain crystal methamphetamine. The driver was booked at Bayview Station on narcotics charges and his truck was towed.

Monday, July 10, 2006, 11:00 AM, Evans & Selby, Homeless Abatement (Case # 060729042): The Bayview District is cleaner than ever thanks to the tireless work of Officer Sue Lavin who is ridding the district of homeless encampments one by one. And they are not just moving to another part of the district. Most are moving into supportive housing for the first time in over a decade. Some are being sent to be with their families, reunited after years of estrangement. But of course, there are those that refuse to move ... Officer Lavin had already arranged for supportive housing for two such individuals that were camped out on Selby and Evans. Clean, furnished rooms are waiting for them to arrive. Unfortunately, they refused to go and instead continued to live on the street, causing both a public nuisance and a health hazard due to the amount of trash that they generated and left around their camp. Officer Lavin had arrested them 7 times so far and they still refused to go into housing, so back to jail they went. Perhaps this time if they get jail time, they will decide to get off the streets.

Monday, July 10, 2006, 11:40 PM, Shafter & 3rd, Robbery (Case # 060731546): Officers were sent to 3rd and Shafter on a report of a robbery. When they arrived, the found their victim standing there ... naked from the waist down. The victim said that he had gotten off the bus at 3rd and Thorton when two men and a woman grabbed his backpack from him. The suspects then took his pants and underwear and then ran away. The victim could not describe his robbers. Officers took the man home after taking the report.

Tuesday, July 11, 2006, 3:41 AM, 3rd & Hudson, Parolee at Large caught by jaywalking (Case # 060731900): Officers Singh and Ferrell were on patrol when they saw a man jaywalking across 3rd. The officers stopped the man and found that he was a parolee at large. He was booked at Bayview Station
