This leads many to believe that our greatest moments of testing will be whether or not we can pick ourselves “up off of the mat” when knocked down by the heavyweight title holder (or in the lens of Bay Area disaster management “The 10.0 magnitude ‘Haywired’ earthquake.” The Institute of Heartmath, the neuroscientists at the forefront of developing resilience in the systems of the human body that sustain life when in energetic coordination, defines “resilience” as: “The capacity to prepare for, adapt to, and recover from stress, adversity, or challenge.” This definition broadens the lens in which we view resilience, specifically that we can invest our energy, time, willingness, and commitment now, so that we are all more prepared today than we were yesterday when the unthinkable happens. Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Ingleside Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Ingleside Station has foot beat officers assigned to the Geneva and Cortland corridors.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Station personnel also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Ingleside Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

The following are some examples of Suspicious Activity that are “In progress” crimes, which demand an immediate call to 9-1-1:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or

Crime Definition

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

A fight between a man and woman ended up with the neighbors involved and the couple being treated for lacerations and bruises. Ingleside Officers Downs, Burke, Fogharty, and Bell responded and watched as the couple fought with each other and neighbors over broken property and whether the male victim would be evicted from the premises. After sorting out the particulars, and viewing cell phone video, the male combatant was arrested for aggravated assault and driven to Ingleside Station for booking. Report number: 180360716

7:50am Unit Blk. Leland Stolen Vehicle

Ingleside Officers Calupad and Dungca were on routine patrol when they spotted an older Honda Civic parked in a red zone with one occupant. A computer check revealed the Honda was stolen. The officers parked around the corner and requested backup. Ingleside Sgt. Young arrived and the officers arrested the male occupant along with his female companion, but not without a considerable struggle. The woman suspect had a screw-driver and other tools used to break into and steal vehicles. Both were transported to Ingleside Station and booked for auto theft and resisting arrest. 2:20pm 100 Blk. 27th Street Trespassing

The co-owner of a residence called police about someone trespassing on his property. He told Ingleside Officers Chan and Peralta that the suspect was inside a work shed on his property. Chan and Phillips found the suspect and asked him to leave the shed with all of his belongings. The property owner signed a citizen's arrest form for charging the suspect with trespassing. A records check of the suspect revealed several felony arrests for several crimes. At the time of the arrest he was on probation after spending 18 days in jail for battery. He also possessed numerous and possibly stolen id's, passports, and health insurance cards belonging to other individuals. He also had pepper spray which is prohibited for a felon. A cab driver called police after being robbed of his belongings. The victim told Ingleside Officers George and Billings that he picked up a man and woman on the 100 block of Catalina Drive who wanted to go to Sunnydale and Hahn Streets. He said the pair didn't talk to him during the ride and wouldn't look at him in the eye. When they arrived at the destination the couple asked him for money while brandishing a large knife. The cab driver exited the cab and ran away to call police. The robbers took the cab driver's backpack and other property and fled in an unknown direction. Burglary

Ingleside Officers McCall and Lozano were dispatched to a report of a burglary at a bike shop. When they arrived the owner and the officers entered the store and found broken glass by a front window along with a broken interior door handle. Several bicycles and bike bags were missing. Store surveillance video shows three suspects approaching the front of the store. One of the suspects is holding a brick. He throws a brick through the window and then enters the store. The second and third suspects stay outside as lookouts. Shortly thereafter, a second suspect enters the store. Finally, all three leave the store using the stolen bicycles. The officers made copies of the surveillance tape and collected other important evidence from the store. Report number: 180355892

Burglary

Another business was broken into overnight with suspects taking valuable property and money. Ingleside Officers Lee, Demkowski, and Smith traveled to a bar where surveillance video from the early morning hours showed two suspects removing gaming equipment, cash, and other property from the back door. The officers discovered one suspect entered the bar by removing security bars from a bathroom window and entering the bar. Surveillance video shows another suspect who may be known by the bar owner. On April 26th several Ingleside officers were involved in an incident at the Safeway Store in Diamond Heights. Here is the description of that event.

10:10pm 5200 Blk. Diamond Heights Evading Police

Ingleside Officers Hardy, Allen, Franceschi, Wyrick, and Campbell responded to a report of a man with a gun walking into the Safeway Store after exiting a Volvo in the parking lot. The officers arrived and noticed one suspect, whom they recognized from previous arrests, enter the passenger side of the Volvo. The Volvo quickly backed out and sped away through the parking lot barely missing parked cars, the officers, other motorists and pedestrians. The officers broadcast a description of the Volvo and ran a check of the passenger who had a long criminal record of convictions for vehicle theft and firearms violations. Report number: 180310664

Saturday morning, at 2:03am, Ingleside Officers Scott and Hardy, assisted three Bayview officers in arresting the suspect in the above incident. The Bayview officers had recognized the suspect from a city wide crime alert issued on April 26th. The suspect was arrested and transported to Bayview Station for booking. Report number: 180310664

3:38am Mission & Brazil Malicious Mischief Vandalism

A passenger boarded an outbound #14 Muni bus with a considerable amount of luggage, too much luggage in fact. The bus driver told the passenger it was too much luggage. So the passenger got off the bus but left the luggage. The driver then took the luggage off the bus angering the would-be passenger who went to the front of the bus and kicked in a window on the front door. The driver summoned police and Ingleside Officers Buckner and King responded and cited the passenger for malicious mischief vandalism. Report number: 180353200

1:36pm Foerster & Joost Warrant Arrest

A man sitting in a truck parked in front of a known "meth house" where several arrests have been made in the past, caught the attention of Ingleside Officer Fazli and Sgt. Kumli. The officers pulled up behind the truck just as the driver exited the vehicle and started walking away. Fazli and Sgt. Kumli stopped the suspect at Foerster and Joost. He gave the officers a fake ID in his brother's name. After additional questioning he provided the officers with his real name. A records check revealed he had two \$5000 dollar warrants for his arrest from Hayward PD and the Alameda County Sheriff's office for narcotics and forgery charges. He also had a "no bail" warrant with a search condition from the Manteca Police Department. The suspect was placed in custody and a search of his truck revealed a quantity of methamphetamine along with pipe to smoke the narcotic. He was arrested for the warrants and the narcotics and transported to Ingleside Station for booking. Report number: 180354402

Ingleside Officers Fogarty and Zhao were on routine patrol when they heard the sound of a revving engine and screeching tires. The officers traveled to the source of the sound and found the driver of an older Ford Mustang doing “donuts” in the street. The officers stopped the 17 year old driver and placed him in custody. He was cited for reckless driving and prohibited driving because he was not supposed to be driving between 11pm and 5am. The juvenile suspect was released to his mother and the Mustang was towed to impound. Report number: 180355488

A woman summoned an “Uber” and was walking toward the driver and his car when an unknown man walked toward her and punched her in the face while grabbing her purse. The victim told Ingleside Officers Govindbhai and Cortez-Cendejas that the suspect and the victim continued to struggle with the purse as the suspect fell to the ground. The suspect dragged the victim down the street toward a waiting black sedan with an unknown driver. Suddenly, the suspect stepped on the victim’s head and pulled the purse from her arm. He then ran to the waiting vehicle which sped away. The officers summoned an ambulance which transported the victim to St. Luke’s Hospital for treatment. The Uber driver told the officers he witnessed the attack and started honking his horn attempting to stop the attack. The loss was a purse containing a significant amount of cash along with a phone charger and other electronics. Report number: 180353266

A known shoplifter, with several previous arrests, decided to pick up a bottle of liquor again without paying. Safeway store employees attempted to stop the frequent thief from leaving the store with the bottle without success. A man and woman waiting for the bus were robbed and assaulted by two unknown men. The victims told Ingleside Officers Parker and Duran that they were at the bus stop when two men approached and asked for money. The male victim told the suspects he didn't have any money. One of the men then aggressively touched the woman victim's body while telling her she "was beautiful". When the woman's companion tried to stop the assault he was punched several times by the other suspect. The male victim surrendered \$50 in cash and the two suspects fled south on Mission toward Geneva. Report number: 180350256

3:15am Unit Blk. Rey Attempted Vehicle Theft

An alert neighbor notified a car owner that two suspects had broken into his parked vehicle. The car owner went outside and confronted the man and woman who ran to a waiting vehicle which sped away. The victim told Ingleside Officers Billings and George that the female suspect apparently used a shaved key to break into his 1998 Toyota. He found the steering column damaged and a set of spark plug wires removed from his engine on the front seat. Report number: 180350381

A confrontation at the Balboa BART bus stop resulted in the victim being evaluated for a traumatic brain injury. Before being transported to the hospital, the victim told Ingleside Officers Chan and Lewis that the confrontation started when he witnessed an unknown man harassing a woman sifting through one of the nearby garbage cans. When the woman left the unknown man started harassing the victim. The victim took off his belt and wrapped it around his fist to protect himself. That threat seemed to work for a while until the victim started walking away. The suspect quickly ran up from behind and pushed the victim to the ground where he hit his head. The suspect then kicked and punched the victim several times before running away in an unknown direction. The victim was transported to Kaiser Hospital for treatment. 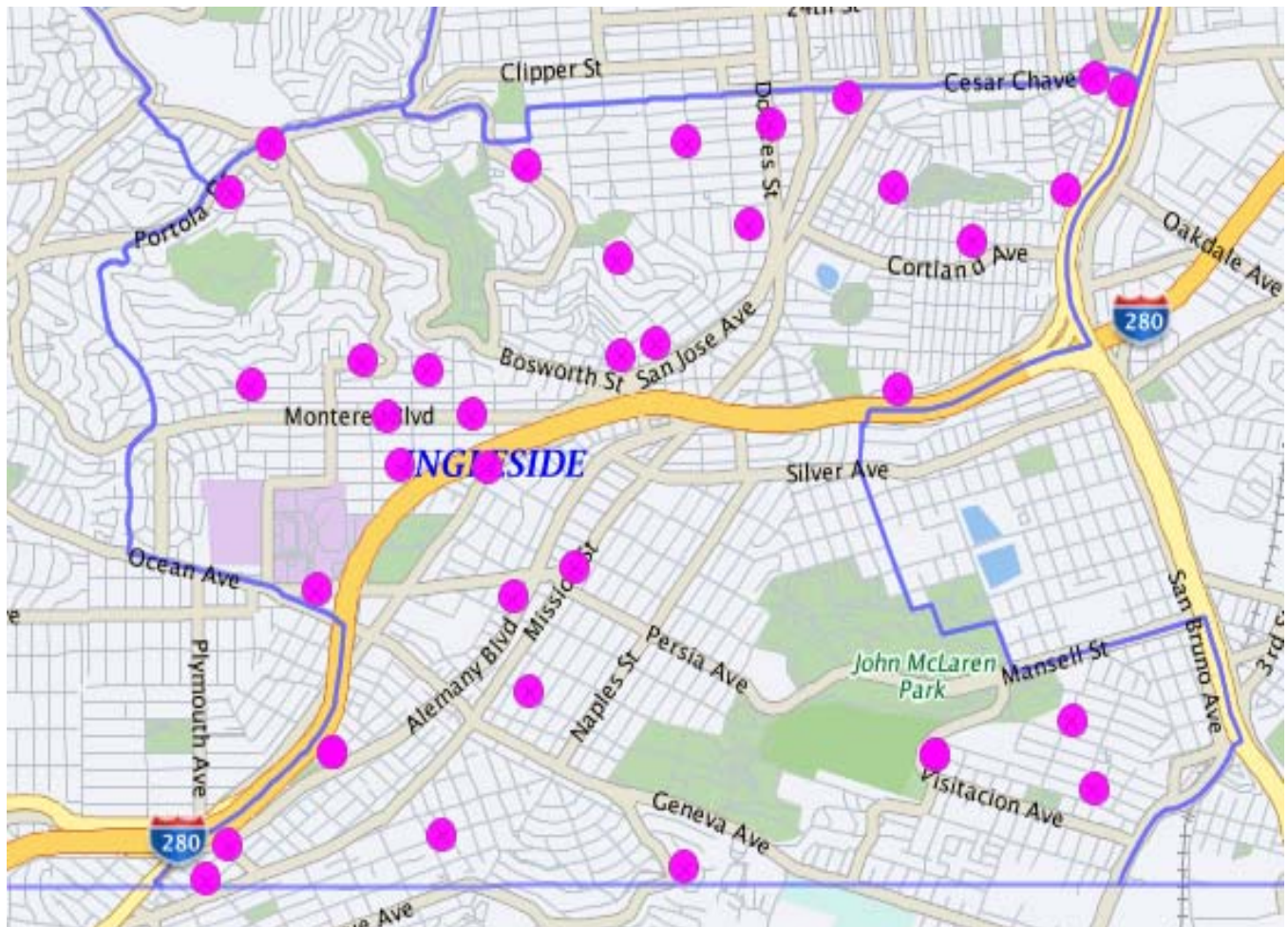

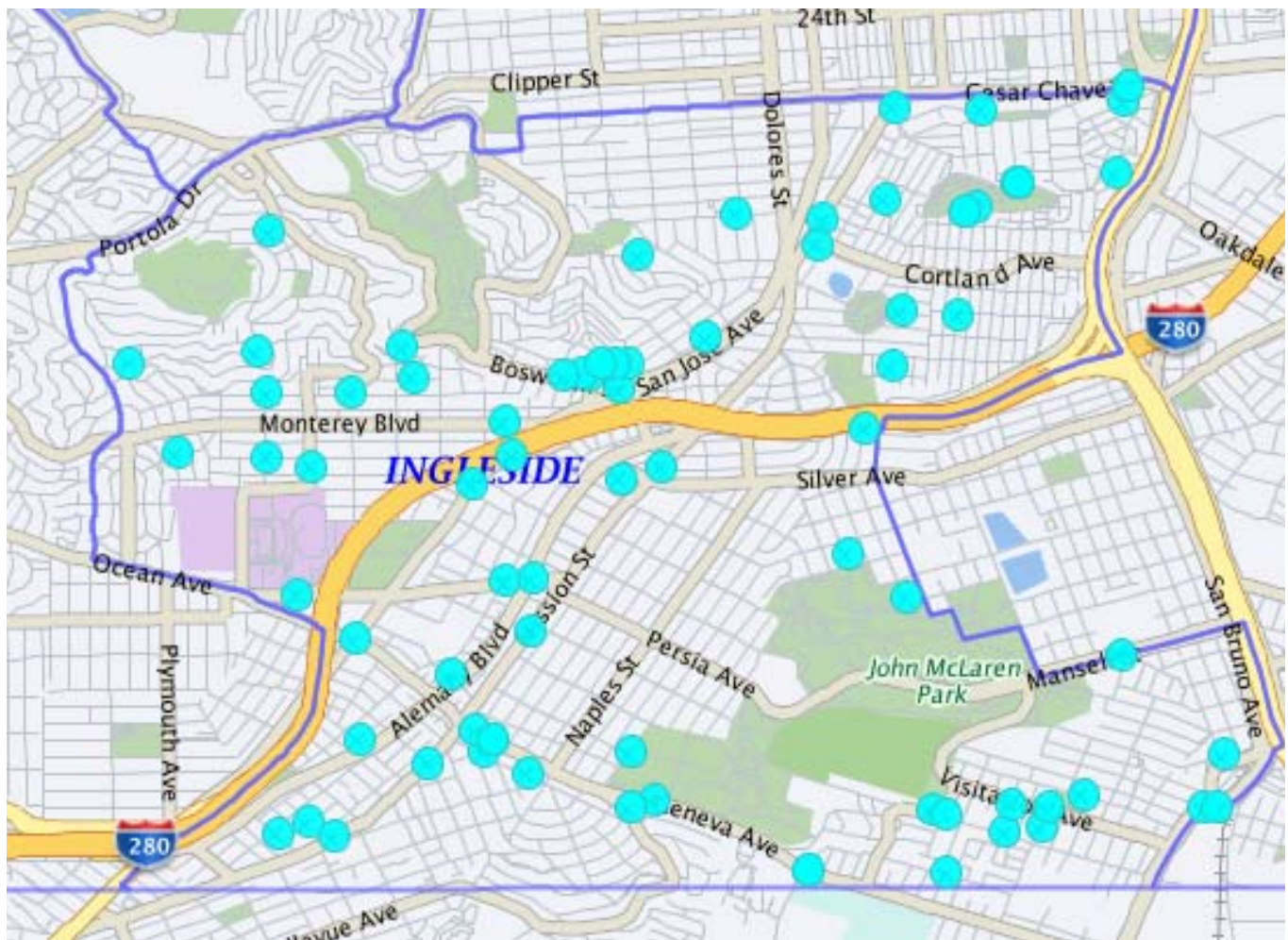

Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on May 8th, 15th, 18th, 24th and 30th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past three years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these non-motorized means of transportation. In 2016, California witnessed 867 pedestrians and 147 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

DUI Saturation Patrols This Friday

San Francisco Police Department's Traffic Unit will be conducting DUI saturation patrols this Friday, May 18, 2018, between the hours of 3:00 P.M. and 11:00 P.M. Research shows that crashes involving an impaired driver can be reduced by up to 20 percent when well-publicized DUI checkpoints and proactive DUI patrols are conducted routinely.

Officers will be looking for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment by checking drivers for proper licensing, delaying motorists only momentarily. When possible, specially trained officers will be available to evaluate those suspected of drug-impaired driving. Recent statistics reveal that 30 percent of drivers in fatal crashes had one or more drugs in their systems. A study of active drivers showed more tested positive for drugs that may impair driving (14 percent) than did for alcohol (7.3 percent). Of the drugs, marijuana was most prevalent, at 7.4 percent, slightly more than alcohol.

Drivers caught driving impaired can expect the impact of a DUI arrest to include jail time, fines, fees, DUI classes, other expenses that can exceed \$10,000, not to mention the embarrassment when friends and family find out.

Auto Burglary Investigation Leads to an Officer Involved Shooting

On May 11, 2018 at approximately 12:59 AM, uniformed San Francisco Police officers in a marked police car were investigating an auto burglary near Steiner Street and Geary Boulevard. One suspect was detained at that location and the second suspect fled on foot to the area of O'Farrell and Webster Streets where he entered a parked vehicle. The suspect fled in the vehicle, a white Hyundai sedan. On the 1500 block of O'Farrell Street a series of events occurred including collisions between the suspect vehicle and two marked SFPD radio cars and an officer involved shooting.

The suspect vehicle fled the scene and was pursued to the area of Polk and McAllister Streets where it stopped inside Civic Center Plaza. The suspect driver was taken into custody.

No one was struck by gunfire in this incident. The suspect driver was transported to the hospital with non-life threatening injuries. An officer that was injured in the O'Farrell Street incident was treated and released at the scene.

This is an active and ongoing investigation in the early stages. Separate investigations are being conducted by the San Francisco Police Homicide Detail, the SFPD Internal Affairs Division, the San Francisco District Attorney's Office Independent Investigations Bureau and the Department of Police Accountability.

The information provided in this news release is preliminary and additional information will be released as it becomes available. As part of our commitment towards transparency and accountability, a town hall meeting regarding this officer involved shooting will be held within ten days.

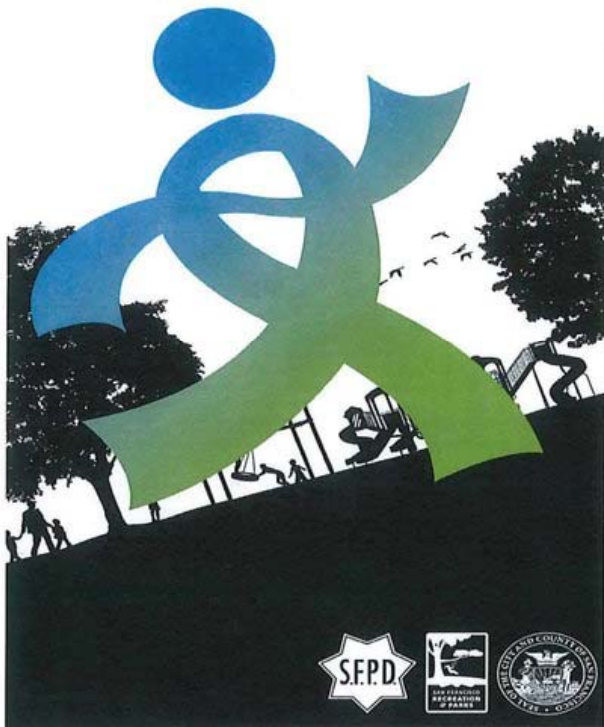

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.
