OFFICERS OF THE MONTH OF JUNE 2018



Park Station's Officers of the Month of May are Officer Alvaro Abaunza #4239 and Officer Ronald Quock #2339!!! Officer Abaunza and Officer Quock were classmates in the SFPD Academy Recruit Class #235, and shortly after arriving to their permanent assignment, Park Police Station, these two teamed up on day watch as the Haight Street Foot Beat. Officer Abaunza and Officer Quock have done an amazing job patrolling Haight Street, and cleaning up Haight Street.

Officer Abaunza has been employed with SFPD for 5 years, and has been at Park Station for 3 years. Officer Abaunza completed his Field Training at Mission Station, assigned to Central Station for his probation period, and was transferred to Park Station for his permanent assignment. Prior to working for SFPD, Officer Abaunza worked for San Francisco Department of Parking and Traffic (SFDPT). In his spare time, Officer Abaunza enjoys traveling extensively and running outdoors.

Officer Quock was born and raised in San Francisco, where he graduated from S.F.S.U. with two major degrees in Business Administrative, History, and a minor in Finance. Before joining SFPD, Officer Quock served in the U.S. Army, and is an active Captain in the U.S. Army.

Officer Quock has been employed with SFPD for 5 years, and has been at Park Station for 3 years. Officer Quock completed his Field Training at Southern Station, assigned to Bayview Station for his probation period, and was transferred to Park Station for his permanent assignment. When off duty, Officer Quock enjoys spending time with his wife, and children going on family trips.

CHINESE IMMERSION SCHOOL'S WALK TO GOLDEN GATE PARK

The Chinese Immersion School (CIS) has an annual field trip for the entire school, to walk to, picnic in, and play games at Golden Gate Park. The principal of the Chinese Immersion School, Wendy Cheong, notified Captain Bailey about the annual field trip at Golden Gate Park, and requested Park Station officers to assist with an escort to and from Golden Gate Park.

On Friday, 6/1/18, Park Station officers assisted in escorting the entire student body of CIS, including staff, and guardians, one their journey originating on Waller St, from Masonic Avenue to Stanyan St., where the student body entered Golden Gate Park. At approximately 9:30 am, Park Station officers meet at CIS, and assisted the student body to Golden Gate Park. The officers returned at approximately 1:30pm, to escort the student body back to CIS. The entire escort of approximately 400 attendees, and went off without a hitch.



MEET THE DUBOCE TRIANGLE FOOT BEAT OFFICERS



SFPD shifted tactics last September in an attempt to reduce vehicle burglaries and other property crimes by increasing foot patrols with officers in uniform and seeking to prevent more crimes before they happen. Chief of Police William Scott said last August that the department will increase staffing at all district stations that will nearly double the number of officers assigned to foot and bike patrols from less than 100 to over 200.

Park Station has sixteen Foot Beat Officers assigned to both Haight Street and the Duboce Triangle area. Four of these officers are assigned to Duboce Triangle area. Two of these officers are Officer Riley Bandy and Officer Keith Lipp.

The hours and routes they patrol in the Triangle constantly change so that they are not predictable. They usually start their shift by checking on calls for service in the Triangle and usually investigate them on foot. They enjoy talking to community members to find out their needs and seize every opportunity to educate the community on crimes and crime prevention.

DUBOCE TRIANGLE FOOT BEAT OFFICERS (CONTINUED)

They check the Triangle's hot spots, which include Duboce Park, the Church and Duboce street corridors, and Belcher Street. Duboce Park has had a problem with transients and drugs. Officer Bandy says he is motivated by the desire to keep parks used by kids free of crime and drugs. Church and Duboce are good places for crimes of opportunity, i.e., lots of people using cell phones are attractive targets for smart phone thieves.

Even though Park Station assign a Duboce Triangle Foot Beat each day, you may not see the foot patrols every day. An officers' hours and routes change daily. Officer Lipp said they have a "fluid assignment," meaning they go to other areas where crimes have occurred or where additional police officers are required.

Officer Bandy points out that they have to wear many hats, including social worker, medic, crime fighter, traffic accident investigator, and more. They make well-being checks and often have to determine if a situation is a medical emergency or not.

Police work is stressful. Officer Lipp said the "goal everyday is to go home at night," but schedules change, especially if there is an emergency, and officers don't always go home on schedule. He said his "heart rate goes from zero to a 100 many times a day" and that a body can be adversely affected by the adrenalin flow. Officers have to assist citizens, who are in stressful situations in addition to arresting people all of which contribute to stress level.

Officer Lipp graduated in Political Science at UC Berkeley, and worked in the tech industry for a while, but ultimately decided on a career with SFPD two years ago since he "wanted to help people and make a difference." He likes the excitement of the job on patrol and appreciates the "team bonding" between partners and on the police force. Officer Bandy has been an officer for four years and is active in the military. He recently received a Gold Medal of Valor from SFPD for his efforts in apprehending an armed robbery suspect while off duty in Oakland, CA.

What they both have in common – is the desire to defend the weak and less fortunate. Both officers say they are "normal people like everyone else."

Both Officer Bandy and Officer Lipp will be guests at the next DTNA General Meeting on June 11 and will answer questions and discuss crime in the Triangle from their viewpoints.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

If you see suspicious activity, please call the non-emergency dispatch line (415-553-0123). The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.

Please attempt to get a description of the subject, description of vehicles involved, location of occurrence, and direction of travel.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- <u>Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users</u>: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- <u>Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings</u>: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- <u>Weekly Email Updates</u>: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES

Definitions

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm and <u>battery</u> is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Officers were dispatched to the area regarding a fight. Upon arrival, officers observed a victim with a laceration on his forehead and requested an ambulance for the victim. The victim stated that the suspect struck him with a beer bottle causing the laceration. Officers located the suspect, and placed him under arrest.

Battery with Serious Injuries/Vandalism to Vehicle—1100 block of Masonic Ave.—05/27/2018 12:29 am

Officers were dispatched to the area regarding a fight between two parties. Upon arrival, officers were flagged down by the victim, who stated that a female suspect that appeared to be intoxicated needed help. The suspect asked to be driven to a location and the victim agreed to drive her because the victim felt the suspect needed assistance. The suspect then grabbed the victim's keys and threw them out of the vehicle. When the victim attempted to stop her, the suspect bit the victim's wrist, causing two puncture wounds. The suspect struck the vehicle windshield with her hands and smashed it. Medics arrived on scene to transport the victim to UCSF for treatment. Officers located the suspect and transported her to Park Station, where she was booked for battery, vandalism, and resisting arrest.

Vehicle Burglary/Vehicle Tampering—100 block of Gardenside Dr.—05/28/2018 6:38 am







CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- Garage: When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- Car: Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- Spare Key: Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- Open Buzzer: When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- Security Cameras & Alarm Systems: Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- Light Timers: Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows: Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- · Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

SAFETY TIP FROM S.F. SAFE



Safety tip for your home:

Help first responders by making sure your address numbers are mounted on a high-contrast background, and that they're illuminated when it's dark.

HELPFUL TIPS

DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!

- 1. When placing an online or phone order, request signed confirmation upon delivery
- 2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
- 3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
- 4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
- 5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
- 6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
- 7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
- 8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
- 9. Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?


3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Pease call the non- emergency dispatch line (415-553-0123) when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.


9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1**.

What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

- If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.
